COMMENTARY:

Ursula Skinner (1873-1965), eldest daughter of Harry and Lizzie Skinner, married Horace Thoman (1871-1925) in 1893 at age 20. The wedding took place at the Skinner home on Main Street in Glassboro – street address unknown. The Thomans and Skinners were Glassboro neighbors.

Horace's parents were Fred and Matilda Thoman. Father Fred was a pharmacist who had run a drug store out of his home in the city of Camden per the 1880 census. Camden Business Directories show him at the corner of 5th and Pine in the years 1887 and 1888. Not long after, he moved his store and residence to Glassboro.

The Thomans ran a pharmacy out of their home in Glassboro from the 1890's until sometime after the census of 1910. Their Glassboro property was located on the west side of Main Street, the second home south of the intersection with New Street. The Thoman property was across the street from two different homes that the Skinners lived in during the late 1800's and early 1900's. Horace Thoman, son of the pharmacist, would have gotten to know the three Skinner gals very well and married the eldest, Ursula.

Ursula and husband Horace stayed in Glassboro a few years after their marriage, where they were recorded in the state census of 1895. Horace, a watchmaker, opened a jewelry store there. Ursula's Aunt Ella Lloyd, and the Lloyd family, were living with them. Per the census, they were located two doors away from Horace's parents – Fred and Matilda. And Ursula's grandparents – Richard Skinner Jr. and wife Elizabeth, were neighbors as well.

By the census of 1900, they had relocated their home and business to the town of Woodbury. Horace died in his fifties in 1925 and the business passed to his son Ralph Thoman.

The Thomans had two children – Ralph and Marion. Ralph (1895-1965) was a jeweler like his father. Ralph lived on Curtis Street in Woodbury. His jewelry store, located on Broad Street in the theatre building south of Delaware Street, was a Woodbury fixture for many decades and was well known to my parents. had one child – Horace Thoman, who was a Woodbury dentist when I was growing up.

Marion (Thoman) Smith (1902-2004), brother of jeweler Ralph Thoman, was an independent woman who left her cheating husband when she was a young woman. She worked on Cooper Street in Woodbury when I was growing up and I saw her every now and then while I was a student in nearby Woodbury High School in the early 1970's. She was well known to my parents and to her first cousin Earl Skinner.

In 1995, my father and I decided to visit her for the first time in many years at her daughter's house. I was surprised to see that the 'working woman' I remembered from my youth was now 93 years of age. Frail, but perfect memory. Her light skin and eyes reminded me very much of her mother's brother, Warren Skinner – my great-grandfather. Marion was able to provide interesting information that is presented in these files.


My father and I visited her again in 2002, but she was not really aware of us. Marion faded like a flower and died 2004 at age 101. Per Vicki Snyder, Marion was interested in the family history and she saved much of her mother's effects.

The ancestors of Horace Thoman include Benjamin Ross, a signer of the Declaration of Independence. Cousin Vicki Snyder has an incredible collection of Thoman family photos dating back to the Civil War era.



Frederic George Thoman (1843-1920) and Matilda Ann (Thompson) Thoman (1841-1923), Engagement Photo, 1865





Fred and Matilda Thoman, 1915




Fred and son Frank?, Fred Thoman's Pharmacy 5th and Pine Streets, Camden, NJ, 1890's




5th and Pine Streets, Camden, NJ, Today [Google Street View]


Surprise Party.



Last Thursday evening the residence of our genial druggist, Frederick Thoman, was beautifully lighted up both without and within, in honor of the wedding of his son Frank. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Wm. S. Zane. The reverend gentleman, being questioned as to whether he thought the knot sufficiently strong, replied, that he doubted the ability of the most capable lawyer in the State to destroy that splice in any less time than three months, however willing all the parties concerned might be. It was certainly an enjoyable time and the guests invited, unlike those spoken of in the bible, arrived in due time, witnessed the ceremony, and paid the greatest respect to the dainties which were loaded upon the table, and after lots of good wishes for the newly married couple, quietly left for Camden and other places on the evening train.

Horace Hammell

Frederick Thoman named his son Horace Hammell Thoman. In turn, his grandson Ralph Thoman also named a son Horace Hammell Thoman. Where did the name Horace Hammell come from? It turns out that Frederick Thoman had been one of the charter members of No. 155 of the Camden Lodge of the Masonic Temple with someone named Horace Hammell back in 1871.

"CAMDEN LODGE, No. 155, was organized February 17, 1871, with the following charter members: Thomas McDowell, Samuel M. Gaul, Christopher C. Smith, William Randall, Past Grands; **Frederick G. Thoman**, William W. Thoman, Josiah Matlack, Bowman Matlack, **Horace Hammell**, Andrew J. Cunningham and William T. Brewer. The organization took place in Wildey Hall, where the lodge has met since. It has had a full measure of prosperity, numbers one hundred and fifty-five members and has a reserve fund of five thousand dollars."


